Girls and women count and must be counted. Reliable, timely data collection and management is a critical tool to help citizens hold governments accountable.

ASKS

Ensure that all policies, plans, data, budgets, and audits related to the implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals and other strategies are **publically available, transparent, and accessible** to non-technical audiences.

Invest in the collection of data disaggregated by gender, age, income, geography, and other characteristics relevant to national contexts in order to strengthen policymaking, programming, and accountability for all and to leave no one behind.

Align data collection approaches, national censuses, and internationally supported surveys with best practices, including the Agenda for Humanity, to track the status of the Sustainable Development Goals and indicators.

Facilitate partnerships between governments, multilateral organizations, civil society, and other stakeholders to share experiences around demands for data collection and to support data collection, data management, and accountability efforts.

Monitor the progress of policy commitments and budget allocations at national and sub-national levels and advocate for adjustments to these policies and budgets as needed.

Support global and national advocacy and accountability through a **thriving civil society**, including the women's movement.

Invest in gender-responsive research and data collection in humanitarian settings, including data disaggregation beyond age and sex stratifiers.
